On 12-16-16, I was assigned as #577, Nevada Taxicab Authority Uniformed Patrol Division.

At about 2306, I was on long route enforcement at McCarran airport. I observed Desert Cab #4028 heading to the tunnel. I began following the cab thru the tunnel. The cab proceeded W/B on the 215, then N/B 15 to downtown S/B on Casino Center, and ended the trip at the Fremont valet.

Traffic stop initiated in the Fremont lobby. Upon stop, I interviewed passenger, Mr. OLIVARES, Ryan at the Fremont. He stated that he did not request the route taken. He also stated that he was not provided with route options, or information that the route was not the most direct. He also stated that the driver just took the highway after stating that it was "faster." OLIVARES also stated that normally when he comes to Vegas, the same ride is normally cheaper, and it appeared as though the ride was longer.

OLIVARES stated that upon traffic stop, the driver stated to him, "We always take the highway."

OLIVARES stated that he did not give anyone permission to take a longer route than necessary. For details, please refer to attached Voluntary Statement submitted by OLIVARES.

Approximate fare total should have been between \$29.00 and \$30.00. Actual fare was \$42.54. For details, please refer to copy of receipt.

Driver was identified as Mr. FUKUZAWA, Robert by his Nevada driver's license and TA permit #110371. He was cited for NRS 706.8846-3, Longer route than necessary.

Upon issuance of citation, FUKUZAWA asked me not to show up at court, because he was going to try and fight it.







Okay. Are you trained by Desert Cab on the 1 WINTER: 2 Nevada Statutes and more specifically, long hauling? 3 FUKUZAWA: Pretty much so. We have a class on that, 4 every six months. We go over it rather succinctly, rather 5 thoroughly, about what questions to ask, what to say, how to б treat your customers for customer service. 7 WINTER: Based on that and perhaps other things you've experienced, have you come to have a schpeal or speech 8 9 that you usually--10 FUKUZAWA: I have a very thorough standard operating 11 procedure whenever I leave the airport through the tunnel. 12 WINTER: Okay. 13 FUKUZAWA: It might vary, it might vary just a little bit, depending on the people if they ask me questions in between, 14 15 but it's about a minute schpeal as I'm driving and it covers area in the NRS 706.4486. 16 17 Okay. And, this is to be in compliance WINTER: 18 with the long haul statute. 19 FUKUZAWA: Absolutely, because I don't want a long haul ticket, it affects my livelihood. I've never had a ticket. 20 21 I'm extending it-I'm talking, maybe I shouldn't, I've never had a 22 long haul ticket in five years. I've been stopped a dozen times. 23 Each time, I haven't gotten a ticket, because I've expressed or

explained to the people, I've talked to the people and I've gone

24

over it very thoroughly as to what I'm doing and why I'm doing it.

WINTER: Do you recall this incident on—what was it,

December 16 of '16?

FUKUZAWA: Very much so.

WINTER: Tell us what you remember about when you first loaded the passengers and what happened.

I loaded the passengers from Texas. Male FUKUZAWA: and female, I believe they were husband and wife. The girl's name was Miranda. She didn't write a statement. I loaded them at Terminal 1. As I was pulling off Terminal 1, I engaged the meter, turned on the \$2.00 airport extra tax, started driving out of the airport and asked them-not told them-asked them, may I take the highway? It's a Friday night, at 11:00, there's a lot of traffic. There's 14, 15 signals, depending on which way you go, not any of the routes here-that were presented as evidence. None of these routes are accurate at all. I've been driving for five years and I've been in town 36 years. I know every route that's feasible to take on a Friday night at 11:00. I asked them, may I take the highway? It's going to be a longer route, it will probably cost more money. They actually inquired, well is it as much as Uber? I said, no, it's a lot more than Uber, Uber is probably half the price. But, would you like me to drop you off? No, we're already in your cab, please go town-please go

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downtown the fastest way. I said, that's the highway, through what they call the tunnel. May I please take you that way?

I proceeded to go through the tunnel--

WINTER: They said, yes?

б

FUKUZAWA: Yes. They said, yes.

WINTER: Sorry, go ahead.

FUKUZAWA: I proceeded to go through the tunnel.

Through 215, westbound, 15 northbound. Got off on Casino Center, 95 southbound, Casino Center. Now, bear in mind, it's the Fremont Hotel on a Friday night, 11:00. All these GPSs are totally inaccurate, totally.

WINTER: When you say 'inaccurate', what do you mean?

FUKUZAWA: Well, they're actually a longer route and they take a lot more time. If anybody knows anything about the new meters, the DT-5s, they're both predicated on distance and time. If you're stopped at any of the 14, 15 signals, if you driven on a Friday night with traffic, and you know, the officer said there was moderate traffic, you know, everything is relative. The traffic was really heavy. There was all this construction. On Tropicana, there's all this construction.

Downtown, there's all this construction. Everywhere, even on a Friday night.

So, I asked them permission. I took it. I got off on Casino Center. When you get off on Casino Center, the Fremont

Hotel is right after Ogden. It's the first hotel. Had I gone any of these other ways, it would've been a longer route in time.

These meters are both predicated on distance and time.

WINTER: Yeah, they're live meters.

FUKUZAWA: They're live. Even if I'm stopped at a light, they'll still make at least two clicks. Two clicks is \$0.46. They click—every time they click, they're \$0.23. I've been doing this for five years, I've got this down.

JUDGE: Counsel, hold on one second. Because your witness is testifying to the DT Meter, can you please lay some kind of foundation as to what he knows about it, how it works, how it's kept? He's the one that brought it up.

FUKUZAWA: Then, yes I will, I'll expound on that.

JUDGE: Hold on.

б

WINTER: You've got to wait for me to ask the question. You're okay. You mentioned a DT Meter, as a new technology meter, explain your experience with that and how you came to know--

FUKUZAWA: When I initially started at YCS, of course the old—they're called the 'old meters' and they've been in existence for 20 years. All the cab companies now, except for several of them, have the new, what they call the DT-5. It's a software system set up by some company called Triad. The way the meter works is predicated on both distance and time. The meter starts at \$3.61, the minute you click it on, it's \$3.50 plus

\$0.11, plus \$0.11 excise tax and then boom, it's \$3.61 the minute 1 2 you pull off the lot. You add the \$2.00 on for the airport tax. The minute you're outside the airport, you're almost at \$12.00. 3 4 It doesn't take but five minutes, okay. 5 So, all these-all these GPSs are totally inaccurate. Ιf the Taxicab Authority is basing their-their long haul statutes б 7 off these GPSs then they're all wrong. Because--8 WINTER: Okay. 9 FUKUZAWA: --no driver, and you can-10 STATE: I'm going to object. I don't even think 11 he's answering the question now. He's just going on and on and on about whatever he wants to talk about. 12 13 JUDGE: That's sustained. 14 WINTER: That's fair enough. Let's talk, briefly, about the different Google Maps and the routes. 15 16 FUKUZAWA: Okay. 17 The first one that you have in the pile is WINTER: 18 the one, I believe it was claimed you went but it was slightly off. 19 20 FUKUZAWA: It was not-it was claimed that I went that 21 way. 22 WINTER: Right. 23 I did not even remotely go that way, so he FUKUZAWA: could not have followed me. The Officer could not have followed 24

me, if he stated under oath that I went this way, initially, I 1 2 didn't go this way, so therefore, he couldn't have followed me. Okay. And that has, getting off at Grand 3 WINTER: Central, turning right on 3rd and Bonneville. Left on Casino 5 Center. What's it like downtown--Friday night--6 FUKUZAWA: 7 --traffic--WINTER: 8 Fremont Street Experience. You can't cross FUKUZAWA: 9 Fremont Street. Fremont Street runs east and west, you cannot 10 cross Fremont Street. The Fremont Experience, to go that route. 11 It's blocked off because they have the overhead light show going on. I-and I-you just literally can't go that way. There's so 12 13 much traffic and you can't go that way. So, I would've had to go around the block several times if I would've even remotely went 14 15 that way, which I didn't do. I went northbound-excuse me,

WINTER: That's where you went.

after Ogden, that's the Fremont Hotel.

Okay. The map of Google, I guess the most WINTER: direct map, which is 7 miles, 23 minutes, going up Joe W. Brown and St. Louis and Santa Paula; is that a way you would go? FUKUZAWA: I don't know-no, that's not the way I would

That's not the way I went. I don't know any driver that

would go that way unless you were—it was necessary to go that way, unless traffic on the freeway or the other routes, the most direct route—like, 4th Street or something was blocked off. Main Street, 4th Street, Las Vegas Boulevard. You would never go Santa Paula, St. Louis, Oakey, never.

WINTER: That's like neighborhoods by the Strip?

FUKUZAWA: Yeah. Yeah, yeah. Yeah, you just wouldn't do it. Actually, it would be on the east side of the Boulevard.

So, you wouldn't really go that way. You would go and get on Main Street or get on—which, Paradise turns right into Main Street or it turns into Las Vegas Boulevard, if you make a right turn. So, that's the way you'd go. You would never go through the residential areas like Oakey and St. Louis. You just—there wouldn't be a need for it.

WINTER: Have you ever had customers in your cab and been driving them through a neighborhood that was—made them uncomfortable?

FUKUZAWA: Absolutely.

б

WINTER: Would this route proposed, the seven-mile route, would that make any passenger you knew--

FUKUZAWA: That would make them wonder why I'm going that way and if I was long hauling them that way. I mean, taking a route that's not the most direct route.

WINTER: Okay. So, we talked about your discussion when they got in the cab and they gave you permission to go the

highway and we've got you getting off Casino Center and pulling 1 2 into Fremont. Uh huh. 3 FUKUZAWA: Officer Dung, did you know who he was that 4 WINTER: 5 night? No, I've never met Officer Dung. б FUKUZAWA: 7 WINTER: Okay. Did you see Officer Dung that 8 evening, before he pulled you over? I did. I saw him on the right side of 9 FUKUZAWA: 10 Casino Center, parked a little bit-a little bit right behind 11 another cab. Then I seen him pull off, when I pulled into the Fremont Street pull off and I pulled into the Fremont Hotel. 12 13 That's when he pulled in right behind me. 14 Okay. What happened next? WINTER: 15 FUKUZAWA: He came and identified himself. Very polite. Very respectful. He asked for my TA Card, my DOT 16 17 Physical and my insurance and registration. I gave it to him. He told me to sit in the car and wait there. 18 19 WINTER: Had the passengers already paid for the 20 fare by then? 21 FUKUZAWA: By then, the passengers had already paid for the fare. 22 23 Okay. With a credit card? WINTER: With a credit card.

FUKUZAWA: --the statute reads, than necessary. Than necessary. So, with that in mind, then the highway, which took me 15 minutes, would've been a prudent route if I-if I knew the traffic, which I knew on a Friday night.

STATE: Okay.

FUKUZAWA: The officer even stated the traffic was moderate. Moderate is relative but I knew it was really heavy on a Friday night.

So, let me ask you a different way, if you 1 STATE: 2 take the freeway or you take the most direct route, even if it's deviated from the map slightly here, if you just take the streets 3 4 from the airport, the most direct route, isn't it true that the 5 longer distance is always going to be the freeway? б FUKUZAWA: Yes. 7 Okay. And, you read-you had a chance to STATE: read the statement of the passengers, correct, that was written 8 9 that night? 10 FUKUZAWA: Yes. 11 STATE: And here it says, driver chose highway route without asking. Did you read that? 12 13 FUKUZAWA: Yes, I did. May I refer to this now? 14 That's fine. Look at the statement if you STATE: 15 want. Yeah, no, I don't-yeah. 16 FUKUZAWA: 17 It says, the driver chose the highway route STATE: without asking. I'm not sure what that—it says, I ask about high 18 19 fare, he said it was normal. I did not give permission to take a 20 longer route than necessary. You see the statement there, 21 there's three statements that really contradict what you're 22 telling us. 23 Yeah, it's all based on this form here, FUKUZAWA: 24 this pre-printed canned form here.

No, no. That's not what I'm asking you. 1 STATE: 2 I'm asking you, there's three statements here, based on what this person in their own handwriting had written. 3 4 FUKUZAWA: Uh huh. 5 STATE: They're saying—the first one they're б saying, driver chose the highway route without asking. That's 7 not on the form. That has nothing to do with the form. I mean, it's clear, without asking. They're saying you never said 8 9 anything. I did. 10 FUKUZAWA: 11 STATE: Okay, did you bring any proof? 12 FUKUZAWA: No. 13 STATE: Nothing to show us what they--14 FUKUZAWA: No. --happened in that cab that night. 15 STATE: 16 FUKUZAWA: No. 17 Now, your saying about what's necessary, STATE: 18 what in your opinion is necessary for you to take it upon 19 yourself to take the long route, without asking? 20 FUKUZAWA: I didn't take it upon myself. Depending 5 on the day of the week, the time and what route you're going, you could actually spend more time on the road which would make a 6 7 higher fare. I've done it many times where the people have said, no, take the street and the-and the street price is even higher. 8 9 STATE: Okay, but does the long route statute, in 10 your interpretation talk about cost? 11 FUKUZAWA: Long haul statute says, than necessary. Okay. So, what you're saying is, according 12 STATE: 13 to the meter, its necessary if there's a lot of traffic and so on and so forth, that's necessary for you to deviate from the most 14 direct route because of the meter. Isn't that what you're 15 16 saying? 17 I didn't say that. FUKUZAWA: 18 What are you saying? STATE: 19 FUKUZAWA: I said just what I said. But, I know the DT-5 now. 9 STATE: Did you bring any documentation to show how 10 a DT-5 works? 11 FUKUZAWA: No. Okay. What does it mean-or, let me finish 12 STATE: 13 on the passenger, so you're saying the passengers approved your route. Do you-in the officer's report, he's stating when he 14 first contacted you, we always take the highway. Is that 15 something you would say? 16 17 After I asked permission. If it's warranted-if you're going to a particular 8 9 place, Friday night, driving the streets in Vegas, 17 signals-14-10 17 signals depending on what GPS you guys want to use here. 11 STATE: How do you know what the traffic is like on the freeway though? I mean, you could get on the freeway and it 12 13 could be worse. 14 Right, because we get continuous reports. FUKUZAWA: We get real-time reports on the freeway-both computerized and 15 radio. I mean, they're in--16 17 Did you bring anything here today to show STATE: 18 us any of those reports? 19 FUKUZAWA: No. 20 STATE: Was there any specific reason why you couldn't have taken the most direct route that evening? 21 Other than, the fare would've been if not 22 FUKUZAWA: 23 the same, more, by taking the streets. So, the only—the only way that Mr. Fukuzawa can take a longer route than necessary, he has to have a conversation with the passenger. The passenger is the one that specifically requests the route. There was no necessity here. It wasn't necessary for him to take the highway. Except by his own words to the officer, that's normal procedure. There was no road closures, accidents. Anything prohibiting him, in his own words, there was no other route that could be longer except the highway. According to the statement, he never got permission from the passenger, nor did he bring anything here today to show what the conversation was in the vehicle. Other than the voluntary statement.

So, there was no necessity, he didn't ask the passenger a specific request of the passenger. I think the evidence and the statement speaks for itself. We ask to uphold the violation.

JUDGE: Mr. Winter.

WINTER: Thank you. The zeal with which the Taxicab Authority pursues these citations is stunning. I heard questions of Mr. Fukuzawa about, did you bring any evidence about what was

said in the cab. He said, yeah, I said, I always do that. I get permission. Well, that's not what this says. This is a—I don't know who generated this, where this came from, this statement. This language was not invented by the guy whose penmanship this is. There's no way—someone told him to write, take a longer than necessary. Someone told him to use that language. Someone in this room did. I just want to get this done. I've been traveling from Texas, it was a long flight. We got down here finally. I'm here and you're holding me up for 20-30 minutes, making me—you've got to do this, you've got to do this.

The only evidence of what took place in that car is sitting right here and he told you what took place. He got permission. He's a smart guy. He doesn't get long hauls, he knows what it takes. The guy can sell it. A guy can sell a long haul, sell a route saying, this is going to be better. That's not a long haul. And if he does that, that's complying with the law.

The reason we have the tunnel is to alleviate the congestion. If you guys have your way that everything must go through Swenson, it gets worse and I don't think the traveling public is served.

There's a burden of proof that you have. This is a misdemeanor, this is a crime. Even though there are relaxed settings for evidence, there's a confrontation clause in the Constitution, he was not allowed to confront these statements. These statements are not—are not of the passengers. This is

language from the statute. It's invented by this officer and it must be a severe push for convictions.

You should not convict. There has been a complete absence of proof and the State has the burden of proof to convict a guy from his livelihood on a misdemeanor. I've said enough.

JUDGE: Thank you Mr. Winter. Based upon the evidence presented, let me deal with one of these statements Mr. Winter has proposed to this Court, that this is criminal and therefore there is a right to confront. This Court that we are in is an Administrative Court. That is the reason why the rules of evidence are a little bit more relaxed. It is pursuant to statute that that's how this court runs and that's what this court follows. The Court notes the objection made by Counsel.

Based upon that, the Standard is reasonableness and whether the State has provided enough evidence to meet its burden. And, whether or not its more reasonable than not that a long route was committed under NRS 706.8846.

Based upon the evidence presented, I do find the following facts: On December 16, 2016 at around 2306 hours, Officer Dung had made contact with Mr. Fukuzawa, driving Desert Cab No. 4028. The officer testified that he was near Zero Level and he was situated facing eastbound, that was near or before the tunnel. The officer testified he followed Mr. Fukuzawa in Desert Cab No. 4028. They—the officer followed Mr. Fukuzawa through the tunnel,

westbound on the 215, northbound on the I-15, southbound on the 95 and then exiting Casino Center, to the Fremont lobby area.

Now, the officer said that he had made contact with both the passengers and also the driver in this situation. The passenger that was interviewed and also who had made the statement, made certain statements to the officer that was consistent with his written statement. So, his oral statement is consistent with his written statement and I will get to that in just a second.

The officer just also stated that he made contact with the driver and the officer stated that the driver said, we always take the highway and something to the extent about not showing up to court, because the driver would fight the citation.

Now, I did hear—let me back up for a second. Under NRS 706.8846 it states: a driver shall not, Subsection 3, take a longer route to the passenger's destination. What that means is, as in distance. This requires the driver to take the most direct route to a passenger's destination, unless one of the two exceptions applies; either, one, necessity or two, specific request to do so by the passenger.

In this situation, the most direct route from Terminal 1 to the Fremont Hotel was about seven miles. I am looking at State's Exhibit A and this is the second map. It was seven miles, approximately 23 minutes. And it was coming out of the airport, taking Swenson to Sahara and then it goes through all these

different streets. Sahara to Santa Paula, going on to St. Louis, to Santa Paula, back again. Oakey, finally to Las Vegas Boulevard, to Bridger and then Casino Center.

I did hear testimony from Defense saying, this is taking small streets, why would we take small streets? The bottom line is, the statute requires the most direct route to a passenger's destination. And here, the most direct route is approximately seven miles.

What I heard from Mr. Fukuzawa is there's other ways to get there that is more direct than the freeway. Mr. Fukuzawa had said that, you could've taken Paradise to Main Street or Paradise to Las Vegas Boulevard. So, Mr. Fukuzawa was knowledgeable of other routes that was more direct than the freeway.

Here the actual route that was taken was longer. According to State's Exhibit B, this was approximately 13.1 miles. This, State's Exhibit B is more consistent with the testimony of the officer as to the route that he followed the Respondent.

So, this route was from Terminal 1 through the tunnel. 215 westbound, I-15 northbound. Exiting—well, it would be 95 going southbound and then exiting Casino Center, all the way to Fremont. Granted, the travel time was longer. The bottom line is, under the statute, it doesn't state time or money. What it focuses on is the most direct route in distance.

Therefore, I do not find that the most direct route was taken from Terminal 1 to the Fremont Hotel and Casino on December 16, 2016 by Mr. Fukuzawa.

Now, there's two exceptions might apply. One is necessity and the other one is a specific request to do so by the passenger. Here, I didn't hear any testimony or see any evidence as to necessity. Instead, I heard that there's a lot of construction. There's a lot of traffic on a Friday night, about this time in the evening. However, nothing forced Mr. Fukuzawa to go on to the freeway. Nothing forced him to go in that direction. Instead, there was no evidence presented. When asked from Mr. Fukuzawa if he did see any kind of—any kind of detour or anything that prohibited him from taking the most direct route, Mr. Fukuzawa testified that he did not. He did not note that there was anything that prohibited him to go the most direct route and force him on to the freeway.

Therefore, necessity does not apply here. The only other exception is a specific request to do so by the passenger. Here, we had a lot of argument between the two parties. What I heard from the officer was that he interviewed the passenger and in this situation the passenger was the male half. His name was Oliver Ryan. Mr. Ryan answered these questions in the voluntary statement orally, as well as wrote them down. I'm looking at a voluntary statement, signed and dated by Mr. Oliveras, December 16, 2017. Here it states, did you specifically request the route

to be taken to your destination, the answer was no. Did the driver inform you the route used was not the most direct route? The answer was no. Did the driver convey or attempt to convey different route options to your destination? The answer is no. And, did the taxicab driver use or attempt to use the highway, the answer was yes.

This statement is consistent with what the officer testified to. And, in-

WINTER: Imagine that.

б

JUDGE: In addition to that, it was beyond because I see that there was actual written sentences down below. Is there anything else that you wish to add? And, there were at least three sentences and it stated, driver chose highway route without asking. I asked about high fare, he said it was normal. I did not give permission to take a longer route than necessary.

Now, when it comes down to what I see in front of me, as to the voluntary statement, it's consistent with what the officer had testified to. I understand that Mr. Fukuzawa claimed and stated during the case, in [inaudible] of defense that he usually has a schpeal, is what he said. He goes through this schpeal every single time. He goes through and tells the passenger that—well, he stated that, it's a one-minute schpeal. He goes through the NRS 706.8846, that he had never had a ticket. He does this dozens of times and he never gets a ticket. And that he said, in this situation, we had a husband and wife come forward, come into

the Taxicab Line, go into Mr. Fukuzawa's taxi. Mr. Fukuzawa put it in drive, engaged the meter and then afterwards, started driving out. He was about 100-150 yards out. Then he asked, where are you going? The passenger said, Fremont Hotel and Casino.

б

Mr. Fukuzawa stated that he asked permission, may I take the highway, it's a Friday. There's a lot of traffic. There's at least 14-15 signals, if you take the most direct route. And that if he takes the highway, it might be longer in distance, probably cost more but it's probably faster.

When asked if there was anything that was going to be presented to show this, if there was a video, if there was a recording, if there was anything to substantiate, the answer was no, by Mr. Fukuzawa.

So, what I have in front of me is, an interview by the officer, a statement that's signed and dated by the passenger and I did not see anything else presented to me.

Based upon that, I do believe that the second exception does not apply. As to the passenger making a specific request, to take the highway and thereby allowing Mr. Fukuzawa to take the longer route.

There was a lot of discussion about the DT-5 Meters and what Mr. Fukuzawa kept on saying was that it's predicated upon distance and time. It's predicated upon both distance and time. I heard this at least five times. Aside from what he understands

the meter to do, there was no knowledge beyond what the meter shows him. I didn't hear any kind of experience or any kind of background as to his knowledge about the DT-5, aside from what Mr. Fukazawa sees in the taxicab. I understand what the DT-5 functions as. I understand that the DT-5 has suggestions as to perhaps a faster route. Bottom line is, under NRS 706.8846, the passenger should be the one to choose and make that decision.

Based upon that, I do believe that the State has met its burden under NRS 706.8846, Subsection 3.

State, what's the fine?

STATE: \$100.00.

JUDGE: Mr. Fukuzawa, that will be \$100.

WINTER: I'd like to request the record together—
last week I was in—Your Honor, last week I was in here and was in
a hurry to get out of here and I heard you have a policy,
somewhere that you must pay the fine or be suspended even though
you're going to be appeal. Normal jurisprudence says once the
fine has been paid, it's over. Is that how this works here, so
