So, Officer Edwards, was this 1 STATE: 2 the individual you spoke with that provided the voluntary statement, was that the one that was paying? 3 4 EDWARDS: Yes. 5 STATE: And, did they tell you-what did they tell you when they first entered the vehicle at the terminal? б 7 EDWARDS: Basically they stated, or she stated that they wanted to go to Paris. I guess the driver gave him-gave 8 9 them some route options. 10 SEWLENE: No. 11 EDWARDS: The driver gave them some route options and she said she wanted to go the fastest route. 12 13 STATE: Do you know what those options were? 14 Specifically, I don't know specifically EDWARDS: 15 what he said, but based on what she stated, she gave him some options and then I asked specifically, did this driver tell you 16 17 that the route was longer and she stated no. 18 STATE: Now, do you know as far as the options, 19 what options they were? I mean, was it route options to go different directions? Was it with the air conditioning on? 20 21 it to listen to the radio? What kind of options are we talking about? 22 23 Based on what the passenger was stating, EDWARDS: 24 the driver, I believe, asked as far as which way do you want to

go and he provided some route options. She said, I wanted to get 1 there the fastest-I wanted to get there the fastest way. 2 STATE: Okay. 3 4 EDWARDS: And, then I specifically asked, did he tell 5 you that the route was longer? She stated no. б Okay. So, at any time did the driver tell STATE: 7 the passenger he was not taking the most direct route? 8 Based on her statement, no. EDWARDS: 9 STATE: Okay. So, you provided two maps. [pause] 10 I don't have them. Let me see yours. [pause] So, the first map 11 that you provided is the most direct route, that's 3.5 miles? 12 EDWARDS: Correct. 13 STATE: 13 minutes? 14 EDWARDS: Correct. 15 STATE: Can you tell the court, from your map that you provided what the most direct route is? 16 17 Yes. Based on the-based on Google Maps-EDWARDS: 18 according to Google Maps, as the vehicle exits Terminal 3, or 19 Terminal 1, I'm sorry. Terminal 1, the driver is to go 20 Northbound on Swenson. Northbound on Swenson and then Westbound 21 on Harmon. Then, Westbound on Harmon and [pause] Westbound on 22 Harmon and it says, then Southbound Las Vegas Boulevard—or, I'm 23 sorry, Northbound on Las Vegas Boulevard and then that would take

24

you right into the Paris Drive.

Okay, is Paris on the east or west side of 1 STATE: 2 the strip? Paris is on the east side. 3 EDWARDS: 4 STATE: Okay. And that was 3.5 miles? 5 EDWARDS: Correct, according to Google maps. б STATE: And, can you tell the court again, the 7 route that was taken-that was, how many miles was that? 8 EDWARDS: The route that was taken--9 STATE: 7.5? 10 EDWARDS: That was actually taken? 11 STATE: Right. Yes. According to Google Maps, the route 12 EDWARDS: 13 that was actually taken was 7.5 miles and Google Maps states that it should be around 12 minutes. As I stated before, the vehicle 14 made that right turn into the tunnel and then traveled I-215 West 15 16 to I-15 North and then Eastbound Flamingo and then Southbound Las 17 Vegas Boulevard and then into the Paris Hotel and Casino. 18 Obviously, if you look at the last page, it actually shows with 19 the shot of the-the meter, it shows the actual distance that he 20 traveled, which was 7.6 miles. 21 STATE: So, contained in the report that you provided, it says, Trip 950 Details. 22 23 EDWARDS: Yes. 24 STATE: That's a-how did you get that photograph?

There's a screen shot on the meter itself EDWARDS: and you can get access to that. It will-you pull that up and you can actually-it will show the driver, the actual driver, who's driving. The driver's ID number. It will show the time the ride started. The time it ended. It will also show the distance that the driver traveled and the payment that was-the payment that was issued. It shows the fare. It shows the extras which were the \$2.00 trip-the \$2.00 airport fee and obviously the subtotal, the tax, tip if there's a tip and then the final total.

It was a Sunday at around 11:30, 2333 hours, around that time. Around that time, going the б 7 most direct route, there was no heavy traffic going up Harmon. 8 Okay, besides heavy traffic was there any STATE: 9 road closures, traffic accidents? 10 EDWARDS: Also, there were no road closures-no road 11 closures, no construction, nothing that would prohibit the driver from taking the most direct route. 12 13 STATE: Now, did you ever speak with the driver? 14 I don't recall whether I did or not. I EDWARDS: 15 don't really recall whether I spoke directly to him, but I did 16 speak with the passenger. 17 Okay. [pause] And the passenger, after STATE: you spoke with the passenger, they wanted to file a complaint 18 19 against the driver? 20 EDWARDS: Yes, the passenger, after I presented thispresented it to them, I told them that if you wanted to pursue 21 22 this, I could-basically, if you wanted to pursue this, I would 23 need you to fill out the voluntary statement and then she was

I may have, I may not have, I don't recall. 3 4 WINTER: Well, you stopped him and you went in at 5 the Paris. You opened the door and you took his TA Card, right? б Yeah, I spoke with the passenger and I-and EDWARDS: 7 I began to speak with the passenger throughout my investigation, yes. 8 9 WINTER: Okay. Did you take the passenger away from 10 the cab driver or the cab to speak with them or did you have a 11 discussion with everybody in the cab? I don't recall if I took her away. Like I 12 EDWARDS: 13 said, I don't recall whether I took her away but the driver was present. How far he was from our conversation or how far he was 14 from the cab, I don't recall. 15 16 Is that something you are trained to do, is WINTER: 17 take the passenger away to talk to them about the --18 EDWARDS: Depending on the situation. I've had many 19 encounters with drivers who become very argumentative and very 20 boisterous. They won't-they will not let me even conduct my 21 investigation. They won't let me talk to the passengers 22 whatsoever. So, I would separate myself from that particular 23 driver and speak with the passenger one-on-one. 24 WINTER: Okay. So, that's your practice now. 25 EDWARDS: That's what I do.

Then I would go southbound on Paradise, which would take me directly into the airport. Then from that point, I would position myself at that particular area, just so I can show there was no construction or—construction or road closures or anything of that nature that would prohibit drivers from taking the most direct route.

WINTER: Okay.

EDWARDS: If they needed to travel up Harmon.

WINTER: Okay. If there is no accident and no road closures and traffic is light, if the passenger wants to go on the freeway, that's okay, isn't it?

EDWARDS: If the passenger wanted to go on the freeway and that's specifically what they requested, to go on the

freeway, it's still the driver's obligation to let the passenger know that if they go on the freeway, it's longer. It's longer and it may cost them a little more money. Once that has already—once the driver has disclosed that to the passenger and let them know that and the passenger still chooses to go that route, the driver is covered, basically.

Now, before you rest, let me ask you JUDGE: 15 a question, Mr. Winter. 16 WINTER: Okay. 17 JUDGE: What I have in front of me, aside from the 18 Officer stating to this Court what the passenger claimed, which 19 was caught in this voluntary statement. It was signed and dated 20 by Jacinda Miller. It states completely the opposite of what your client has testified to. So, what do you have to present to 21 22 this Court to show that one, this route was requested and your 23 witness, your client stated many times he was told to go on the

freeway and that the passenger knew about the accident. And

therefore, she-she said, according to your client, I know Las

24

Vegas, there's always accidents, always traffic, I've been here 20x to Las Vegas, I know the price, take the freeway.

So, right now, I'm looking at a voluntary statement signed and dated by the passenger Jacinda Miller that states completely the opposite.

WINTER: Actually, I don't think so, but go ahead.

JUDGE: So, the question-

WINTER: What it says-

about what's in the voluntary statement. My question to you is, what do you have to present to me today, whether in writing, on the phone, video, I don't know what you want to present as evidence, but something to show that Jacinda Miller or even the male counterpart, chose this freeway.

WINTER: Well, the only evidence you have in front of you is that the passengers directed the route. You cannot take a longer route than necessarily unless specifically requested to do so by the passenger. The direct evidence you have here is the evidence of my client here. He said, they told me. We heard, well there was an accident. I'll grant you, maybe there wasn't. He hears about an accident. She says, I've been here 20x, as you note, take the freeway. Get there the fastest way. Was there discussions about longer? No, it's not inconsistent. He says, no I didn't say that. They directed me to go on the freeway. That's the law.

JUDGE: Okay. And, I have a voluntary statement 1 2 signed and dated by Jacinda Miller asking her, did you specifically request a route that was taken to your destination, 3 4 the answer is no. So, do you have anything further to offer this 5 Court? Other than the testimony of my client, no. б WINTER: 7 JUDGE: Okay. Do you rest? WINTER: I have rested. 8 9 JUDGE: Thank you. Rebuttal. 10 STATE: [pause] I'll try to call the passenger. 11 JUDGE: I'll give you five minutes. We'll take a five-minute recess and we'll come back. Off the record. 12 13 Recalling the 7:30 Calendar on April 25, 2017. Sewlene, 14 Permit No. 32158. We're here for Citation No. 57405. Counsel. 15 STATE: I could not get a hold of the passenger and her voicemail is full so I couldn't leave a message. So, I have 16 17 nothing further. 18 JUDGE: Okay. Closing. Based on NRS 706.8846, Subsection 3, with 19 STATE: 20 respect to a passenger's destination, a driver shall not take a 21 longer route to the passenger's destination than is necessary 22 unless specifically requested to do so by the passenger. 23 In this case, the passengers were picked up at Terminal 1. 24 I don't believe there was anything discussed about a longer

route, not taking the most direct route. There was some

testimony about an accident. There was nothing presented in evidence as to there was an accident and the passenger knew about it and directed the driver. So, based on the voluntary statement from Jacinda Miller, when asked, did you specifically request that route to be taken to your destination, they checked no. Did the driver inform you that the route taken—being taken was longer and not the most direct route? They stated no. Did the driver convey or attempt to convey different route options to their destination? It states, yes. I asked the driver what those were, he said he didn't convey any options to the passengers. Did the taxicab utilize or attempt to utilize the highway? Well, we know it's yes because the officer followed them from the airport.

Now, this extra information, I think here is pretty important, that the passenger filled out. It says, driver never told us the route he took would be longer. I asked to go the faster route. So, that's—that's pretty significant because at that point, the driver had never mentioned anything about a longer route of travel or it was not the most direct route.

As far as, I asked to go the fastest route, I'm not clear if they stated that or they were asked a question and they replied that way, but the fastest way could mean the most direct route. It could be a lot of different things. It specifically says, driver never told us the route he took would be longer. She signed it. Voluntary statement. The driver said there was

no options. And even if there was a slight bumper to bumper accident, which there's nothing in evidence to say that, the road was never closed, the—road was never closed. There wasn't any construction. There was nothing prohibiting the driver from taking the most direct route. If he doesn't take the most direct route, he has to convey to the passengers that he is not taking the most direct route and it will be a longer distance. At this point, there was no conversation. He already actually started to move when he engaged the meter and then began to conversation with the passenger, his own testimony.

At no time did he ever mention, until today, that there was an accident. He never mentioned anything to Officer Edwards. He had several times to interact with him but never said anything about that. In his conversation, he never said anything at all to Officer Edwards. I mean, obviously, he had to sign the ticket. He obviously had some kind of interaction with him but nobody ever mentioned anything about, you know, why he had to take that specific route.

Based on the statute, I believe there's a [inaudible] type of incident that was necessary here to avoid taking the most direct route. It was never conveyed to the passenger based on their voluntary statement. We ask you to uphold the violation.

JUDGE: Mr. Winter.

WINTER: Thank you. With respect, this should've been dismissed and not prosecuted. The law, as I read it, and

sometimes I'm not very good at reading, but it's unlawful to take a longer route to the passenger's destination than is necessary.

Necessary is kind of a weasel word. If there is an accident or maybe you've got to go around something [tape cut] slightly longer—unless specifically requested to do so by the passenger.

I will grant to you the voluntary statement to the extent it's voluntary. It is inconsistent. But that's not our burden. We don't have a burden of proof, do we? The State has the burden of proof.

What evidence do we have? We know there was another passenger in the car. May have been a husband, it was a male, who according to the unrefuted testimony was, had paid the \$35.00, didn't want anything to do with this. Ms. Miller was probably asked questions about, did he say it was longer? Did he say it was longer? That isn't a long haul. You don't have to says it's longer when they direct it. You don't have to do that at all. If I jump in a cab at the airport, I say, I'm going home. Take the tunnel. That's it.

The only time you have to take a longer route is getting the permission. If they direct you to the freeway, they direct you to the freeway. Now, I know there's a real desire over the TA to write long haul tickets. That's what we've seen coming off the docket, that's all there is. Long haul. Well, there's other stuff but the vast majority is long hauling. This is a guy who picked up a fare. There's an accident, maybe there wasn't an

accident, but there's some suggestion maybe it would be slower, who knows. They say, go to the Paris, take the freeway. I want to get there. I asked to go the fastest route.

This is not a magical game that after they say, take the freeway, I want to get there the fastest route, he has to say, whoa, whoa, whoa, wait a minute, you know it's longer, it might cost some more. Would that be smart? Maybe so, I don't know. It might have helped if this officer had asked some questions of the guy he's going to write a ticket to. What did you talk about? They said you didn't say it was longer. Well, they told me to go the freeway. There could've been something like that.

I think there's an absence of proof. If you read the statute and you accept the testimony, the only person whose here who can testify about what the conversation was in the cab, you have to dismiss this. That's all I'll say.

JUDGE: Thank you. Based upon the evidence presented, I find the following facts:

On February 26, 2017 at 2333 hours, Officer Edwards made contact with the Respondent, Mr. Sewlene, driving Desert Cab No. 4063. The officer testified that he was in a location where he watched and saw cars heading down from departures, heading into the tunnel. The officer stated he was about 50-75 feet from the tunnel and he could see the downhill ramp.

So, then he noticed Mr. Sewlene driving Desert Cab No. 4063, coming from the direction down the hill, into the tunnel.

The officer stated that he saw Mr. Sewlene's Desert Cab No. 4063 loaded with passengers because the meter was engaged. Therefore, that told him that it was loaded.

The officer followed Mr. Sewlene onto or through the tunnel on to the 215 westbound to the I-15 northbound, exiting Flamingo, going eastbound on Flamingo, southbound on Las Vegas Boulevard to the Paris Hotel and Casino. That's where the stop was made. The officer then made contact with both the passenger and the driver at that time.

Under NRS 706.8846, it states, a driver shall not, under Subsection 3, take a longer route to the passenger's destination. There are two exceptions to that, I will get to them shortly.

In this situation, from T1 to the Paris Hotel, the most direct route was 3.5 miles, about 13 minutes. From T1, exiting T1 northbound on Swenson, westbound on Harmon, northbound on Las Vegas Boulevard to the Paris Hotel and Casino. The actual route that was taken was longer than the most direct route. Here it was approximately 7.5 miles, 12 minutes. From T1 to the Paris, it was through the tunnel, 215 westbound, I-15 northbound, exiting Flamingo, going eastbound on Flamingo, southbound on Las Vegas Boulevard to the Paris Hotel and Casino.

This Court also notes that under State's Exhibit A, there was a picture of the meter and it showed the distance of 7.6 miles. 7.6 miles is longer than the most direct which would've been 3.5 miles.

So, there's two exceptions that would allow a driver to take a longer route to a passenger's destination. One being necessity and then another one being a specific request to do so by the passenger. Here under necessity, the officer stated there was no road closure, there was no detour. There was nothing that forced Mr. Sewlene to go onto the freeway.

The officer was questioned about when did he take that route, because he actually drove that route and the officer stated it was about 10:45 to 11:00. He also had driven Swenson and Paradise and the officer stated there was no accident there.

What this Court heard from Mr. Sewlene was that he heard something on the radio saying, hey there's an accident and the accident is located on Swenson and Tropicana and therefore, there's heavy bumper to bumper traffic. There was heavy traffic.

This Court was looking for something more. This Court didn't see that there was an accident, that it closed the roadways. Instead, when asked of Mr. Sewlene, did he know that there was an actual accident, did he witness it? Meaning, did he see the road closures, did he go and witness it and he stated, no he did not, he heard it on the radio.

Therefore, I do not believe that necessity applies. When it comes down to a specific request to do so by the passenger, I heard testimony from Mr. Sewlene and he said that there as a man and a woman in his cab. He believed they might be husband and wife. That what they ended up doing was, they got in and he

engaged the meter. He asked, how's your day, how's your flight, where are you going and the passenger stated, Paris.

That's when supposedly the passenger had heard of the accident off of Swenson and Tropicana and that's when the passenger said, I know Las Vegas, there's always an accident, always traffic, I've been here 20x to Las Vegas. I know the price, take the freeway.

This Court was looking for something to show that this route was requested by the passenger. I didn't see any kind of evidence that it was shown, that the passenger chose this route. Instead, what I have in front of me is a voluntary statement, signed and dated by Jacinda Miller. Which shows completely the opposite. It was dated February 26, 2017. When asked, did you specifically request the route that was taken to your destination? The answer was no. Did the driver inform you that the route being taken was longer than the most direct route? The answer is no. Did the driver convey or attempt to convey different route options to your destination, the answer was yes. Did the driver use or attempt to use the highway? The answer is yes. Is there anything else you wish to add? The answer was yes, driver never told us that the route he took would be longer and I asked to get—I asked to get the fastest route.

Now, when it came down to, I asked to get the fastest route, there's no indication that the freeway was chosen by the

1	passenger. Instead, when asked specifically, did you request the
2	route that was taken to your destination, the answer was no.
3	Therefore, I do not believe that the second exception,
4	which was specific request by a passenger has been satisfied. I
5	do believe the State has met its burden under NRS 706.8846.




